UNIT HISTORY

JANUARY 1944

During the month of January, the life and activities of the battalion did not differ greatly from the previous four months; that is, until a mewement was executed at the very close of the month. All aspects of the unit, construction, administration and recreation continued at Honington as before.

Early in the year, on the 7th of January, important promotions in Company "B" were announced. S/Sgt. Raymond L. Hardy, 35255981, was appointed the First Sergeant of the company. Two Sergeants, George G. Aldridge, 35256022, and Henry E. Buszek, 32233000, were promoted to the grade of Staff Sergeant as platoon sergeants.

Other than the promotions mentioned, the only other noticeable change among enlisted personnel of the battalion were a few losses. On 4 January, Pvt. Lucian Shinabarger, 39185874, Company "A", was transferred under guard to the 2912th Disciplinary Training Center (par. 6, SO No. 332, Hq. KBS, 28 Dec 1943). Pvt. Andrew B. Beauchamp, 36170527, Headquarters & Service Company, was transferred under guard to the ETO Disciplinary Training Center on 17 January (par. 10, SO No. 14, Hq. KBS, 14 Jan 1944) and was followed by Pvt. Philip S. Damiano, 12038343, and Pvt. Roy A. Boggs, 37146068, Headquarters & Service Company, on 22 January (par. 14, SO No. 17, Hq. KBS, 17 Jan 1944 and par. 6, SO No. 18, Hq. KBS, 18 Jan 1944) and by Pvt. Frank A. Bieszczt, 35255482, on 26 January (par. 1, SO No. 26, Hq. KBS, 26 Jan 1944). Two men, Tee 5. Carl N. Smith, 32207396, Headquarters & Service Company, and Pvt. Philip Germanaro, 33070987, Company "A", were transferred to the Detachment of Patients of the 36th Station Hospital and the 231st Station Hospital respectively (par. 4, SO No. 5, Hq. 818th Engr Avn Bn., 11 Jan 1944 and par. 3, SO No. 13, Hq. 818th Engr Avn Bn., 25 Jan 1944).

Replacements; however, more than made up the losses. Tec 5. Frank W. Kelly, 32199002, who had been previously transferred to a hospital, rejoined the battalion on 7 January (par. 27, 50 No. 3, Hq. 10th Repl Depot, WES, 3 Jan 1944). On 18 January, Pfc. Joseph Steffin, 334,59734, Pvt. Vestal B. Lewis, 34,574110, and Pfc. Philip J. Misastro, 32198444, another former member of the organization, reported for duty (par. 12, SO No. 15, Hq. EES, 15 Jan 1944 and par. 1, SO No. 14, Hq. 10th Repl Depot, 14 Jan 1944). The following day, Pfc. Louis J. Bouselli, 33603031, Pvts. Warren J. Cotes, 36122532, Paul L. Spratt, 35576596, Henry Vernaci, 19174797, and Kenneth E. Sickles, 15110529, joined (par. 19, SO No. 17, Hq. KES, 17 Jan 1944). Pfc. Charles V. Berrett, 33399977, reported on 22 January (par. 34, SO No. 19, Hq. 10th Repl Depot, WES, 19 Jan 1944).

Only two changes occurred among the officers of the unit. Lt. Dewsnap received his promotion to First Lieutenant on 1 January (par. 10, 80 No. 1, Hq. ETCUSA, 1 Jen 1944). And on the twenty fifth of the month, Lt. Angle was assigned to Company "B", leaving his former duties at Company "C".

As to the mission, by 26 January it was approximately 92% complete. A total of 148 buildings, Nissen, WO, Robin, Romney, Seco., T-2 Hangars, Transit Sheds, brick and prefabricated type were erected. 16,000 feet of sewer lines and a filtration sewage disposal plant were constructed, with 115 manholes. A steel water tower of 60,000 gallons capacity and 65 feet high was assembled. On the fighter base to be, a steel mat runway 1800 feet in length and 150 feet in width, and a tarmac runway 1250 feet long and 150 feet wide were laid. In addition, such work as the laying of read fillets, electrical installations, plumbing and boiler facilities, water lines, the construction of a fuel compound, oil installation and wash racks, the grading and filling of a motor park and the clearing and grading of approximately 50 acres were undertaken and completed.


The battalion was never to complete the depot. On 27 January, it departed from Homington, at 0815 hours, on route to Great Barrington, Oxford, arriving at 1615 hours the same afternoon. (MO No. 82, Hq. EBS, 24 Jan 1944). At its new station the mission of the unit was the planning and the execution of an intensive training period during the next two months.

The conditions at Great Barrington were the worst encountered since the early days of overseas service. A pertion of a half-constructed, supposedly winterized camp, situated on the estate of a Colonel Wingate, was assigned to the battalion. Missen huts were available only for headquarters installations. The living quarters of the unit were pyramidal tents. In the middle of the English winter, stoves to heat the tents were not available for two weeks. English winter, stoves to heat the tents were not available for two weeks. The camp water supply was found to be contaminated and the available running water supply was out off. Facilities for messing, for almost any other purpose, were at a minimum. It was two weeks before the battalion began to be comfortably settled.


The change of station also brought a change in the status of the unit.



USSTAF, 23 Jan 1944, 322, subject: "Assignment of Units"), and was assigned as part of the Minth Air Force, on the same day, Headquarters, Ninth Air Force, made the battalional part of inc. 

UNIT HISTORY

FEBRUARY 1944

The first few days at Great Barrington, Oxford, were passed in housekeeping and in making preparations for the coming training period. A regular program of six days of training, eight hours a day, and one day off a week for the entire battalion was planned and approved by the 926th Engineer Aviation Regiment, the unit pesponsible to Engineer Headquarters for the training of subordinate units.

The training program was under way by the second of the month. At the outse emphasis was placed on basic infantry training with intensive physical exercise. Close order, extended order, manual of arms, the use of the obstacle course, calisthenics and other simple but necessary classes were stressed during the first week. As the battalion became better trained, emphasis was placed on more advanced subjects such as the laying and clearing of mine fields, camouflage and combat principles. A ten mile and a fifteen mile hike in conjunction with an overnight bivouac in Barnsley Wold, Gloucestershire were taken by each company. Although the battalion was handicapped all during the period by being unable to acquire the necessary prepared training aids, the program during this month was well planned and executed.

In addition to the regular training exercises, members of the battalion were afforded the opportunity to engage in specialized training. Several enlisted men were detailed to radio and cryptographic schools to become specialists which the organization badly needed. It Merbitz and a group of motor pool personnel attended a school in vehicle waterproofing to prepare them for future operations. A small group of gunners were sent to Northern Ireland to a course in firing the 50 cal. anti-aircraft machine gun. The remainder of the gunners of the unit were given the opportunity to visit a range at Minehead, Somerset, to fire the 50 cal., the 30 cal., machine guns and the 37MM anti-tank gun. Later in the month, another group of men under It Dewsnap and It Lund attended an anti-aircraft course at an Army Air Force station in southern England.

Further training and experience was gained by units of the organization by two missions assigned to the battalion by regimental headquarters. It Widowski and the second platoon of to a left Great Barrington for Ashford, Kent, to construct a Butler combat hangar at an airfield there, a job which, under unfavorable conditions, lasted fifteen days (FO# 5, Hq, 926th Engr Avn Regt, 3 Feb 1944). On the twentieth of the month, It Pearson proceeded to Patcham, Sussex, accompanied by fourteen men, to build a takeoff for a Flying Fortress which had made a forced landing on the English countryside while returning from a mission over Europe. The Fort took to the air before the end of the month (FO# 11, Hq, 926th Engr Avn Regt, 20 Feb 1944).

During the month, the organization increased in enlisted strength. Pfc James J. Collura, 31068628, a former member transferred to the hospital, reported on 3 February(par 13, SO# 30, Hq, 10th Repl Dep, 30 Jan 1944). Two other former members rejoined their units the following day when Tec 5 Jack C Hart, 39385537, and Pfc Jacob G Goldman, 31068377, reported for duty(par 15, SO# 30, Hq, 10th Repl Dep and par 63, SO# 30, Hq, 10th Repl Dep, 30 Jan 1944). On 6 February, Tec 3 Joseph L Terrill, 7001121, Tec 4 James E Matthews, 13017178, Tec 5 James E Welchel, 6973614, and Tec 5 Joseph A Biggar, 33028178, were placed on temporary duty with the battalion pending the receipt of permanent transfer orders(par 1, SO# 18, Hq, 926th Engr Avm Regt, 6 Feb 1944).

Losses in the battalion were extremely few. Tec 4 Earl F Oesterreich, 36302708, was relieved from assignment to the battalion and transferred to the Air Corps, to be returned to the United States for training as an Aviation Cadet(par 9, SO# 41, Hq, ETOUSA, 10 Feb 1944). Pvt Andrew J Wosnock, 33252770, Co A, was transferred to 58th General Hospital 24 Feb 1944, and Sgt Francis Schmid, Co B, was assigned to the same organization on the last day of the month.

Among the officers, Lt Hill, the Supply Officer, and Lt Smith, commanding Co B, received promotions to the rank of captain on the first of the month(par 25, SO# 32, Hq, ETOUSA, 1 Feb 1944).

Recreation during the month was cut to a minimum. Except for the movies which were shown in camp every evening, circumstances did not lend themselves to elaborate recreational facilities. Away from camp, the personnel of the unit continued to travel to London during passes. The nearest large city was Oxford, rich in tradition and culture, but even more crowded than had been the towns of Thetford and Bury St Edmunds. A quiet, friendly town was found in nearby Burford, famous for its old hotels and public houses. After the first ten days, an armored battalion was billeted in the town, and conditions there were the same as in Oxford.


The month ended on a sore note. On the 27th of February the battalic, made a forced march to Barnsley Wold. The schedule called for the 12 lies to be completed in three hours. The March began shortly after 0600 (bur) in the morning and by 0930 hours, just a few minutes behind mhedule, sie mattarived at its destination. 



UNIT HISTORY

MARCH 1944

The month of March was one of the most active months in the history of the battalion. At one time or another, almost every member of the battalion was absent on temporary duty. Three missions were assigned during the month, and a detachment from the organization was detailed to participate in a landing exercise held on the southern coast of England. At one stage, only nine officers and less than 300 enlisted men were still in Great Barrington.

On 2 March, Lt. Henry and the accord blatoon of Company "C", with attached personnel, which gradually amounted to some 45 enlisted men, departed for Grittleton, Wiltshire. The mission of the detachment was the establishment of a tented camp for reception of the 878th A/B Engineer Aviation Battalion arriving from the United States (FO #13, Headquarters, 926th Engineer Aviation Regiment, 28 February 1944). By the fourteenth of the month, all details at Grittleton were complete and the personnel returned to their station.

Lt. Batchelder, with the first platoon, Company "B", and attached personnel, gradually amounting to a total of approximately 65 men left Great Barrington on the fourth to erect a Butler combat hangar at Staplehurst, Surrey FO #14, 2 March 1944). The deadline established for the assembly of the hangar was met and on the 16th of March the detail returned to their organization.

Company "A", minus 25 men, was detailed on temporary duty to Membury, Wiltshire, on 4 March. The company was assigned the construction of a Marshalling Area of pierced plank at an Army Air Force Station (FO #12, Hq. 926th Engr Avn Regt, 27 Feb 1944). The assignment was completed on the date established and the unit rejoined the battalion on the tenth.

On 7 March, Col. Hall led a detachment of the battalion on Exercise "FOX" (FO #2, Hq. 29th Inf. Div., 5 Mar 1944). Eleven officers and 143 enlisted personnel left Great Barrington for the south coast to participate in a loading and unloading exercise, climaxed with the construction of an emergency landing field. The exercise was a success and the mission accomplished. A week later, the party returned to camp.

Lt. Lund and Lt. Dewsnap were at an Eighth Air Force Machine Gun School with thirty gunners. On 10 March, Lt. Henry left the job at Grittleton and with Lt. O'Malley took another detail of thirty men to the same course. It was at this point that only 7 officers and less than one third of the battalion was on duty at Great Barrington.

The regular training of the battalion continued as best possible under circumstances. Firing on the rifle range continued and, during the two months of firing, 75% of the personnel fired the weapon with which armed. All available members of the unit were put through an infiltration course.

Still later in the month, two other groups were ordered to attend service courses. On 22 March, Lt. Widowski and 64 men journeyed to Northern Ireland to receive the Eighth Air Force Cal. .50 AA School. And a group of sixteen men were detailed to attend a waterproofing school on 26 March.

The first decoration to be conferred upon a member of the battalion was presented on 17 March. M/Sgt. John C. Owens had been awarded the Legion of Merit, for meretorious service as the battalion motor sergeant since July 1942 (GO #17, Sec II, Hq ETOUSA, 16 Feb 1944). The medal was presented to Sgt. Owens by Brigadier General James B. Newman, commanding Engineer Headquarters, at a Regimental parade in which the 926th, the 816th and 830th took part.

The entire battalion, less Headquarters & Service Company, departed from Great Barrington on a three day exercise 23 March with stripped T/BA and a three day supply of "C" and "K" rations. The unit left camp at 1015 hours by motor transport. At 1300 hours the same day, field headquarters in a 2½-ton truck was established at Brockhampton, Gloucestershire, and camp was pitched. During the afternoon the letter companies executed assigned missions and the battalion operated as normal. In the evening, a movie was shown in camp with a field arrangement for the projector.

After further exercises the following morning, the battalion broke camp at Brockhampton at 1500 hours and moved by motor march to Guitting Wood, Gloucestershire, a distance of 4 miles, arriving at 1600 hours. Again the battalion pitched camp and exercises were held during the night and the following morning. At 1300 hours on 25 March, the exercise came to a close and the unit proceeded back to Great Barrington.

With the close of the exercise, the training period of the battalion came to a close. The unit received a warning order that it was to move at the close of the month. During the training mission, the unit had received valuable conditioning. Aside from the physical training, the refreshing of members in basic infantry training and in long marches, which they had largely forgotten, the training received in weapons firing, in the use of the machine guns and 37 mm guns, experience in the waterproofing of vehicles and actual participation in an embarking and loading exercise would prove helpful to the unit in future operations. Work on steel plank and on combat hangars added to the battalions' qualifications. The static conditions of the preceding year were discarded and to a great extent, the desired mobility of a unit of the type was achieved. Bivouacing and training in the field and, last but not least, knowledge gained in the bad and good of the "C" and "K" ration, all helped to make the unit a more well rounded one.


As if to prove that the program had been a rugged one, ten men were lost to the battalion during March. Pvt. Ruben J. Dawson, 35803259, Tec 5. Mitchell Moore, 35256300, Pfc. William R. Goodwin, 35255428, Tec 5. Earle S. Connell, 31068310, Cpl. Eli H. Kraman, 32199003, Tec 5. Roscoe P. Miller, 35255037, Pvt. Sol Geier, 32115642, Pvt. Albert B. Mass, 37616292, Tec 5. Ralph Leonard, 33131565, Pvt. Chester E. Troxell, 35798040, were all transferred from the organization to hospitals.


A few changes also occurred among the officers. On 5 March, Capt. Smith was relieved of command of Company "B", was assigned to Engineer Headquarters, and Capt. John M. Frassrand, 0387906, was received as a replacement (par. 15 and 16, SO #69, Hq Ninth Air Force, 9 Mar 1944). Also on 5 March, 2nd Lt. Geesler, who had been absent on detached service since April last, was relieved of assignment to the unit and was transferred to the Engineer Bridge School, SOS (par. 21, SO #58, Hq. ETO, 27 Feb 1944).

The battalion was finally brought up to the limits in officer rank with the promotion of Chaplain Arnold to Captain. (par. 2, SO #75, Hq ETOUSA, 15 Mar 1944). All grades allowed by the T/O were occupied.

The battalion began preparation for the move contemplated on the first of the next month. On 25 March, orders were received to execute a permanent change of station to Alconbury, Huntingdonshire (ltr, Engr H₁, Ninth Air Force, 25 Mar 1944). Preparations were made accordingly. Two days prior to movement, verbal orders from Engineer Command were received through the Regimental commander that the change of station was to be made to North Witham, Linconshire. Orders were received the following day and, again plans were made accordingly (ltr. Engr Hq, Ninth Air Force, file 370.5, 29 Mar 1944).

UNIT HISTORY

APRIL 1944

The month of April opened with the movement of the battalion on the very first day. At 0830 hours, the unit left Great Barrington en route to North Witham in accordance with orders previously received. The motor convoy moved as planned and halted for lunch north of Bedford. Colonel Hall, who had preceded the battalion to North Witham by a few hours, met the convoy at this point. He issued instructions that the unit should proceed to Kettering, Northamptonshire, and not to North Witham, on the verbal orders of the Commanding Officer, Eastern Base Section. At 1530 hours, the battalion took its station at the EHS Transient Camp #1, on the estate of the Duke of Buccleugh.

The official status of the unit at this point was not clear. Unofficially, the unit, a part of the newly activated IX Engineer Command, Ninth Air Force, was to be attached again to Eastern Base Section. Orders on the change were never received and confusion as to the exact duties the unit was to perform added to problems. The Engineer at VIII District, EBS, seemed to have no doubts as to the status of the organization from a technical point and assigned various construction missions. As far as administrative and supply were concerned, however, the unit seemed to be neither fish nor foul, being part Eastern Base Section and part IX Engineer Command, with a touch of the EBS Transient Camp #1 added.

After almost two years in the United Kingdom, the organization was not too proud to be established in a transient camp used for the benefit of incoming units from the United States. After arrival, the usual housekeeping was done and assignments were eagerly awaited. In the meantime, the battalion had to be contented with making improvements, such as latrines, grease traps, etc., on the transient camp, a far cry from the construction of an \$8,000,000 aerodrome at Great Dunmow.

The camp, as such, was a great improvement over that at Great Barrington. It was well arranged, with adequate buts for battalion and headquarters installations. Sanitary facilities were more than enough. Even the tented living areas were better than usual. Even its location, in Burton Park, only two miles from Kettering, was above the average.

The battalion as a unit did not remain in Kettering for long. As construction missions were assigned, detachments and companies of the outfit moved to the sites of the missions, all movements by the verbal orders of the Commanding Officer, Eastern Base Section. It. Pearson and the second platoon of Company "C" moved to the AAF Station 549 at North Witham on 7 April to construct a combat hangar on the base. On the tenth, Company "A", less the first platoon, followed to North Witham to construct another combat hangar and an additional road on the field. It. Batchelder and the first platoon of Company "B" were detailed to AAF Station 110 at Poolbrook, Northamptonshire, to make repairs on concrete at the station. Company "B" departed from Kettering on the tenth to take station at AAF Station 125, Deenethorpe, Northamptonshire, again to make repairs on runways and hardstandings. Company "C" less the platoon at North Witham, took station at AAF Station 111, Thurleigh, Bedfordshire, for the same purpose. The remaining platoon of Company "A", under Lt. Betts, was assigned the mission of erecting a combat hangar at AAF Station 102 at Alconbury, Huntingdonshire.

The unit was ordered to participate on its second loading and landing exercise during this period. On the 18th of April, a detachment of the battalion, consisting of 30 officers and 226 enlisted men, under the command of Major Cutter, departed for temporary duty with Exercise "BOOMERANG" (FO "Boomerang" 2, Hq. IX Engineer Command, 14 Apr 1944), With the battalion scattered over a wide area, this detachment left the strength at Kettering at a mere 6 officers and 107 enlisted men.

With the return of the detachment from Exercise "BOOMERANG", Headquarters and Headquarters & Service Company departed from Kettering on the twenty-third for a permanent change of station to Alconbury, Huntingdonshire (MO #380, Hq. EBS, 16 Apr 1944). Prior to the move, the battalion had received numerous inquiries from both higher headquarters as to why the movement had not been made on 16 April, as specified. Orders for the movement were not received until 17 April, however, and, in view of Exercise "BOOMERANG," a further extension on the date for movement was granted.

The new station again was a tented area, located near AMF Station 102 and AAF Station 547. There were no huts available, but the engineer battalion that had occupied the area had made the most of it. Facilities were good, and the clear, warm weather that prevailed made living conditions excellent.

Only one further change in location occurred during the month. On 26 April, Lt. Widowski and the 2nd platoon of Company "A" left North Witham and established itself at AAF Station 130, Glatton, Huntingdonshire, to resurface the runways at the base.

One of the greatest losses suffered by the organization occurred on the 18th of April. Lieutenant Colonel Hall left the battalion, assigned to 1922nd Engineer Aviation Regiment and Major Lloyd A. Cutter assumed command (par. 5 and 6, 30 #19, Hq. IX Engr Command, 17 Apr 1944). The loss of Colonel Hall was a shock to all members of the unit. It had been haped that he, who had seen the activation of the unit and commanded it overseas, would be its commander at its demobilization.

Captain Bauer was appointed to be the executive officer of the battalion and It. Wiedeman was relieved from assignment to Company "A".

Two promotions to the first three grades mer amounced during the month.

Sgt. Elmer E. Knaus, 3504,6425, was promoted to Staff Sergeant on 14 April as
Supply Sergeant, Head-warters & Service Company. On 17 April Sgt. Ellis B.

Thornhill, 7000961, Company "B", was promoted to Staff Sergeant replacing
Glen A. Beesley, 35255965.





Before the month was out the battalion was alerted for overseas shipment. Orders were received to that effect on the twenty-eighth of the month and preparations began immediately.



UNIT HISTORY

MAY 1944

The first part of May found the battalion officially stationed at Alconbury, Huntingdonshire, with units scattered over various air fromes in the vicinity. Work continued under the supervision of the VIII District, Eastern Base Section, to which the battalion was attached. Technically, during the early part of the month, the battalion came under the command of the Western Base Section. The Eastern Base Section was disbanded, and the VIII District, EBS, became part of Western Base Section, But, as previously, the unit was still considered to be a part of Engineer Command, Ninth Air Force, and came under the Base Section only for construction.

Prior to being relieved from the construction tasks, several other subordinate units of the battalion were detached and assigned typical missions. On 6 May, Lt. Widowski and his platoon from Company "A" made a change of station from North Witham, Lines to AAF Station 111 for the purpose of repairing the airdrome. Lt. Betts moved with his platoon of the same company from station at Alconoury to AAF Station 106 at Grafton-Underwood, Northants, to conduct construction operations there. And, on 2 May, Lt. Lund and a platoon of Company "C" moved from Thurleigh, Bedfordshire to Harrington, Northants on a similar mission.

Work on the assigned missions came to an abrupt end with the receipt of movement orders directing a permanent change of station for the entire battalion from Alconbury to AAF Station 422, Great Barrington, Gloucestershire, from where it had departed six weeks before (Ltr. Hq. IX Engr Cmd, 7 May 1944, file 370.5, subject: "Movement of Troops". Battalion Headquarters executed the move on 11 May, and, by the thirteenth of the month, all other subordinate units and detachments had arrived at the new station.

The battalion was relieved of attachment to the Western Base Section (Ltr. No. 270USA, 10 May 1944, file AG 322 OpGC, subject: "Troop Assignment No. 63) and again came under the sole command of IX Engineer Command (Far. 8, GO #135, Hq. Ninth Air Force, 15 May 1944). Upon arrival at Great Barrington, the unit was attached to the 922nd Engineer Aviation Regiment, the Executive Officer of which was Lt Col. Hall, formerly commander of the battalion. (Ltr. Hq IX Engr Cmd, 7 May 1944, file 370.5, Subject: "Attachment of Unit").

While at Great Barrington, the battalion was engaged in various activities. After the permininary task of erecting a complete tent camp to lime in, units were engaged in construction of more permanent installations for AAF Station 422, in training, in preparing men and equipment for shipment overseas. On 18 of the month, Company "A" and Company "C", a platoon of Company "B" and elements of Headquarters & Service Company left Great

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Barrington on a mission to Ashton-Keynes, Glos. A problem was set up, consisting of the assumption that the unit was to construct an advance landing ground six miles in the rear of the front line. Midway during the operation, the units were subjected to a simulated bombing, strafing and gas attack, a breakthrough in the line, and evacuation of the site within an hour and a half was required. The evacuation with all heavy equipment was accomplished according to schedule. The units then returned to the site and continued construction on the strip. Considerable difficulty was encountered in completing the mission, as the ground chosen was verily a bog and one that lended itself unfavorable to good construction. After passing the nights of the 18th and 19th in bivouac on the job, the units returned to their proper station.

Facilities for recreation at AAF Station 422 were limited. Due to the situation, passes were limited to within 25 miles of the camp and only for a period of 18 hours at the maximum. Not more than 10% of the personnel could be on pass at any one time. Liberty vehicles were scheduled to Cxford, but the city had little to offer in the way of recreation. Movies were still held nightly in the battalion theater and the summer weather brought on an inter-company baseball league. To supplement the program, dances were held at Great Barrington by units of the battalion, at which the battalion band performed in the usual expert manner.

During the month, the enlisted strength of the battalion decreased, party due to the fact that four men were transferred to other units as overage. Tec 5 Joseph S. Rajkowski, 32198343, Pvt. Kenneth E. Coombs, 31068433, Tec 5 Ralph D. Leonard, 33131565, Pfc. William R. Goodwin, 35255428, Tec 5 Earle S. Connell, 31068310, were reassigned to the organization from various hospitals. Losses included the transfer of Pvt. Wenzel J. Rebitz, 36235072, Pvt. Joseph Novak, 35263057 and Pvt. Joseph L. Wanser, 12018066 to other organizations for the serving of court-martial sentences. Four men, Pvt. Charles Styles, 31068373, Pvt. Robert E. Flooks, 31091610, Pvt. William L. Golden, 32212991, and Pvt. Dellon B. Arrington, 38046582 were transferred to 902 Engineer Air Force Headquarters Company, AAF Station 491 (Par. 3 SC #47, Hq. IX Engr Cmd, 18 May 1944). Tec. 4 Frank M. Oliva, 32198945, Tec 4. William E. Perkins, 35256136, Tec 5. Hubert P. Langley, 36160278, Tec 5. Floyd L. Stevens, 35256008, Pvt. William Q. Clear, 15098900, and Pvt. Frederick A. Perkins, 31068388 were all lost by transfer to the hospital.

Among the officers, considerable change was made. On 13 May, It. 0'Malley was assigned to Company "C" and was relieved from duties as Personnel Adjutant. With the expected transfer of Capt. Frassrand for rotation to the United States, It. Pearson was moved from Company "C" on the same date and was appointed in command of Company "B". It. Wohead was relieved from assignment to Battalion Headquarters as Assistant Engineering Officer and was assigned to Company "A". It. Angle, Company "B", was placed on Special Duty with the Engineering Section to replace It. Wohead. Orders relieving Capt. Fransrand from assignment to the organization were received on the 20th of May (Par. 10, SO #45, Hq. IX Engr Cmd, 16 May 1944). On 25 May, 1st It. James A. Brown, Jr., Ollo4064, CE and 1st It. Robert Pettus, Ollo1993, CE, joined the battalion (Par. 6, SO #53, Hq. IX Engr Cmd, 24 May 1944), were assigned to Battalion Headquarters and Company "B" as Assistant Engineering Officer and Flatoon Leader respectively.

SECRET Lt. Fulmer received a promotion to the grade of First Lieutenant on 15 May (Par. 10, SO #136, Hq. ETOUSA, 15 May 1944). During the month, a detachment of one officer and 9 enlisted men were placed on detached service at Camp Blandford, Dorset, and were not expected to rejoin the unit for a long period. They were 1st lt. Betts, Tec 3 Everett L. Wickizer, Tec 5. Howard J. Lloyd and Bugene Writtenberry, Pfc. Joseph H. Taylor, and Pvts. Salvatore J. Castaldi, Henry D. Cunningham, Edward G.
